

Describing Re-scribing

Being a builder of aircraft, one annoying aspect of an aircraft build (as there are many) is sanding the seams smooth and clean only to sand away the engraved panel lines at the same time. The builder will find this at almost every seam. I am hard-pressed to think of a glued seam where there are no panel lines on a plane.

With this being said, I have finished a few of my earlier builds without re-scribing the engraved panel lines and they look like excrement. So, I thought, 'how hard could it be to re-scribe the engraved lines with the simple tool I had?' That tool would have been a single-edge razor blade. On the next build, I tried that single-edged razor blade to re-establish the engraved panel lines and that looked even worse. Yes, even worse than excrement which I would rather not think about.

So, on YouTube, I found a Czech Republic builder, David Damek, whose

videos are under the title 'Plasmo.' Fun Facts: Plasmo is the smash of 2 words: Plastic and Model (fun). By coincidence, it is also a Latin word meaning: to form or shape (more fun!). I watched and learned so much from David, one is the best way to re-scribe engraved panel lines. I have included this video at the bottom of the article.

He uses 4 things: electrical tape (or the option of DYMO vinyl tape), a razor saw, and a scriber. These items can be bought at your budget level; however, the fourth item is... patience. Unlike the other tools, this one is used in every step. Spare no expense on this tool.

The electrical or DYMO tape (see the next paragraph for the difference) is used as an edge connecting one end of the engraved panel line with the other end of the broken panel line. The edge of the tape is now mimick-

ing where a panel line was sanded away. The razor saw will be lightly dragged along this tape edge to establish a slight cutline. Do it a second time (with light pressure, again) and make the cut a little deeper.

Footnote on Tape: Like Plasmo David, I use electrical tape because it is thick, however, it is also flexible and soft. This may cause the edge to waver and/or be cut if too much pressure is applied. I find electrical tape best for the leading edge of a wing because of its flexibility it sticks to a rounded shape and is only needed for a short distance. For a lengthy scribe (flat wing or fuselage length), I use DYMO labeling tape. It is vinyl, very thick, does not waver, and keeps a straight line. However, it does not hold well on a round shape.


The razor saw looks like a double-edged razor blade, however, both edges have very tiny teeth and a lot of them. The metal is also very thin, so, when you saw into plastic it leaves a very thin cut line. It can be bought with and/or without a wooden handle. I purchased the JLC brand at a show. However, online you can find additional to the JLC brand, Micro-Mark items, and CMK (Czech Master's Kit).

As stated above, the razor-saw can be passed along your chosen tape as many times as needed. Each kit manufacturer uses different plastic... some soft, some very hard.

Once you feel you have established a clean cutline, you lift your chosen tape off the model and see your handy work. By this time, if you need to improve the cutline with the razor saw, the line should be established

enough to use the saw by hand without the tape edge. Use low pressure and take your time.

Now, the scriber. Professional scribing tools (also known as a burin) are found with a variety of cutting tips. Professional engravers and dentists use these metal tools to cut lines into a number of hard materials. I have many dental tools from a member of the Wilmington NC Plastic Modelers who happens to be a dentist. They are free and I use them for many things, but I must say the Tamiya Scriber 2 is designed to perfectly scribe plastic out of a cutline from the razor saw.

The scriber works like a plow. When dragged along the saw cutline (that has right-angle walls), it removes the sidewalls away in curls of plastic on both sides and leaves a V-shaped engraved line. A dry brush, airbrush blast, or a lung full of hot air (haha...that's you, Alan) will get rid of the waste plastic dust/curls.

Now, the kit's panel lines look continuous and just like the factory panel lines. Also, the new engraved panel lines accept your favorite wash beautifully. These simple tools and methods can really make your model look great and not look like excrement (or worse). And isn't this what it's all about?

GOSH! Hawk! part two

This article is continued from last month's issue.

Last month we ended with jig angst, but, eventually I had the jig constructed and was ready to insert the fuselage/lower-wing/float assembly into place and adjust the holders to align the upper wing for gluing.

Well, the problem here is although the idea was sound, adjusting the jig to get the fuselage centered and the height and the angle of wing inclinations correct and then one set screw will loosen and then that adjustment is now out of alignment and . . . I'm SURE it will become easier as I get more accustomed to using it but HOLEY KAZOOZAS it was a massive pain to get everything just right.

But, eventually I got everything juuuuuuust so and managed to glue the upper wing on. I did the interplane, (outer), struts first, then took the Hawk off the jig, inverted it on my work space and reinforced the glued struts with a second round of glue. Then I proceeded to the inner struts, those between the fuselage and the upper plane. Of course, there was some adjustment on wing alignment because there is *always* some adjustment on wing alignment needed, yes? No? Yes?

Whatever.

And, of course, two of the float struts broke during this process so they must be repaired . . .

But we now have both wings attached and can now move along to the horizontal stabilizers. Once done it's time for clear coat and decals and then

final assembly and some detailing, touch up, weathering and dullcoat.

So there is still a bit of weathering to do and and the aileron connector and I will probably go back in and rig the bracing wires but overall she is finished enough to show at our chapter meeting. After all of my carping and bitching I am pleased with the results and the fact that I have yet another unique addition to my collection and it is one that relatively few other people have bothered with.

I love Curtiss Hawks, I already have another F-11 variant in house ready (continued on page 6

to start and I guess I should really build one of the straight old Monogram F-11s for comparison.

I rate this kit as "good". It would have gotten a "great" if a little more engineering had been done in terms of location pins, etc., but it went together fairly well and has some lovely detailing and options. Another point of contention is the float option that can be built is supplied with markings for the Peruvian Air force which was my choice. However, now that it is complete, those of you with sharp eyes will note that Peru is *not* included as a user of the bird in the listing that follows. How fun it that? If you can find one at a less than cutthroat price I recommend buying and building it.



Hawk III

Export version of BF2C-1 with an 770 hp (570 kW) R-1820-F53 for Argentina, China, Thailand and Turkey; 137 built.

Hawk IV (Model 79)

Export version with an 790 hp (590 kW) R-1820-F56 engine; one demonstrator built.

The F11C-2 Goshawk was produced in two export versions as the Hawk I and Hawk II fighters.

Essentially a modified XF11C-2, the Hawk II was fitted with a Wright R-1820F-3 Cyclone rated at 710 hp (530 kW) at 1,676 m (5,499 ft) and 356 l of fuel while the Hawk I had 189 l of internal fuel. Both versions carried the same armament as the production F11C-2.

Only the Hawk II was exported in quantity with Turkey, the first customer, taking delivery of 19 on August 30, 1932. Colombia placed an order at the end of October 1932, receiving an initial batch of four twin float-equipped Hawk IIs, the first of a total of 26 float fighters delivered by the end of July 1934. The Colombian Air Force used Hawk II and F11C-2 based in floats in the Colombia-Peru War in 1932-1933. Nine Hawk IIs were supplied to Bolivia, of which three had interchangeable wheel/float undercarriages; four were delivered to Chile, 52 to China,[4] four to Cuba, two to Germany, one to Norway & 12 to Thailand as Hawk IIIs.

One final irony, just in case you did not know, is the story of the pair of Hawks bought by Ernst Udet and shipped back to NAZI Germany. Those two, supposedly, provided the germ of the idea for dive-bombing finalizing in the development and service use of that most perverse and perversive of all dive bombers, das Junkers Ju-87 Stuka.

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Preview: USS Ward DD-139

(above) Heads up on Black Cat Models upcoming, (March hopefully), release of a truly historic vessel. The Wickes class USS Ward fired the official first shot for America in World War Two.

One might argue that DD-145 Greer, operating in the Atlantic, fired the first U.S. shots in September of that year. But that was when the U.S. was actively pursuing a policy of "armed neutrality". All that changed with the Japanese attack on December 7th and America was plunged headlong into the conflict. That makes Ward a very significant piece of history.

Historical nitpicking aside, this is a long, long overdue kit. The classic 4-piper kit is produced in mixed media consisting of resin, 3-D printed detail parts, photo-etch and brass masts and spars and the parts shown

on the instruction sheet appear to be beautiful.

The instructions look to be comprehensive and the steps of construction seem logical and area specialized, In other words, step one and two focus on the stem and what parts go in this location. The next step covers the forward 4-inch main gun and deck fiddly bits just forward of the bridge and so on.

There is an option for making mount #1 with or without a gun shield and the notation on the instructions that some parts are duplicated might indi-

cate that you would not be limited to building only Ward. The sheet of decals consisting of multiple numbers which would tend to bear this out

I have long wanted to build a 1/350 scale Wickes class DD and Revell's, while a fun build, is in the wrong scale and, frankly, dated. And if my experience wit BCM is any guide the accuracy and detail of the build should be superb. Benjamin has an interesting line of escorts, auxilliaries and landing craft available and all look wonderful. Check out the site here:

It's definitely worth visiting.

I admit to being a big fan of Black Cat from using their accessories on other people's kits, and I am really looking forward to this one. ■



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Raupenschlepper.Ost

My contribution this month is my Raupenschlepper.Ost, also known as the RSO/01 Steyr tractor for short. In German, the translation would be "Caterpillar Tractor, East". The RSO/01 was designed and introduced in two varients in 1942 by Steyr Werke of Austria.

It was conceived in response to the poor performance of wheeled and half-track vehicles in the snow and mud during the Wehrmachs disasterous first Autumn and Winter on the Soviet front.

Other models were to follow but the RSO/01 itself was introduced in two variants; the cargo carrier and the Self Propelled Anti-tank vehicle Armed with the PAK 40. The vehicle had a max. speed of 19mph and a range of 190 miles. As far as the model in concerned, this is the Italeri kit. It was a pretty basic build with no major problems. The windows were cut down to appear rolled down and the doors left partially opened. There was not much for interior detail but I did leave extra equipment on the front seat. I wanted to make sure it would be noticed.

The model was painted with Tamiya paints and some oils to accent panel lines as necessary. It was weathered in my usual manner and then the bed filled with various cargo. The oil drums are AFV Club and the rest are from the extra parts bin. All the accessories were painted and weathered separately. A little bit of mud and I thought it came out pretty well. It's an older kit but not a bad one.

than a little trepidation I sent all the required information to big brother PayPal.

They also have a link where you can send them your SSN and passport information, but that is not required, so I didn't, nor do I have any intent to do so. They're getting just a little too nosy with all that information and I don't see a good reason to give them all that.

One reason is since January 1, 2022, the IRS is very interested in any income over \$600/year individuals make from on-line sources such as Zelle, Venmo, CashApp; and I believe PayPal is also on their list.





New Bern Model Rail Show, 2/19-20

February 19th and 20th was a special weekend. Special for New Bern, for the Carolina Coastal Railroaders, for our sister organization, the New Bern Maritime Modelers Guild and us. It was the two-day model rail event and those train guys were kind enough to invite us to participate.

And MAN, did they treat us well! We non-rail-heads were given tables right inside the entrance to the downtown convention Center and were able to man it for pretty much the entire run of the show.

Was it a fun time? Let's hear what some of the table volunteers say . . .

My wife and I got to the ECPM table about 9:15 AM on Saturday morning and had a steady stream of visitors during the three hours we were there. Our location meant everyone entering and leaving the show had to pass directly in front of us, and while not everyone stopped to talk they did get a good look at the display. I brought a partially completed 1/9th scale GPZ-400 motorcycle kit, tools, paint and a cutting mat to sit everything on, and that seemed to catch people's interest. My three main observations in the time I was there:

1. Normal was back.

The show was busy the entire time we were there, with the crowd ranging from older die-hard train hobbyists (identified mainly by a piece of clothing with a train on it) to families with children in tow or in strollers. They were there to look at the displays, purchase items to support their hobby (see #2) and to enjoy themselves. It was the first event I have been to in two years that reminded me of the way things were before the pandemic.

2. People were there to buy. I walked thought the vendor area twice, and while not finding anything to purchase it was clear many attend-



ees were not having that same problem. The fact that the number of such events in this area is small (this one may be the only one) certainly helps, but there was no doubt those interested in trains were making the most of it. Someone asked if my unfinished motorcycle was for sale, saying her father was interested in them.

3. There may be hope for our hobby. Several older males came up to us, said they used to build models when they were young, and were thinking about getting back into it. That is probably the same trajectory anyone in this hobby has experienced (myself included), but that is not what gave me hope. A father & son approached near the end of my shift and pointed out the incomplete motorcycle kit, then explained to his young son why some parts were painted, others were in primer, what some of the tools were for and why a couple of pieces were on long sticks (to hold for painting).




