#### Jim Gower is a member in good standing of ECPM and also the President of our sister organization, the New Bern Maritime Modeling Guild.

As most model boat builders that are actively involved in numerous types of boat building projects, my good friend and member of the Carolina Maritime Model Society located in Beaufort N.C., William Prentice sent me a photo of a model the owner was interested in restoring.

Well, being a N.C. native and that of the Battleship named after our State, who could possibly not have a spike of interest. I contacted the owner who has a residence in Emerald Isle, N.C., and made arrangements to go and discuss his desire and get my first look at this model.

What a surprise when I saw the model! At first, my thought process funneled it to a "folk art" model because the North Carolina did not have portholes and the turrets were rounded like the British and French warships pre-WWII.

Have you ever heard the word "*re-search*"? Well, I learned a valuable

lesson from that day regarding this old 1940\* model, built by the owner's best friends dad. So now that the base line regarding the model is established, lets proceed.

I kept thinking to myself what was I going to do with a 80 year old model as the owner had given me a brief history that his best friends dad had built this model from a kit in 1940, and he has had it ever since.

Now "research" begins to make me appreciative of history and my folk-art theory was shot down in flames.

After a few days, I posted a few photos of the model online and the curator of the real U.S.S. North Carolina Memorial in Wilmington, N.C. picked up on the photos and proceeded to inform me of this model.

It seems this kit which is balsa and bamboo paper/card stock was distributed in 1940 by the Whitman-Ace Publishing Company. Mary Ames Booker, the curator informed me that they had 2 complete kits of this same model and a partial one there at the museum. She offered to send me a copy of the original plans, along with some parts out of the partial kit they had. (In the meantime, our sister club, the New Bern Maritime Modelers Guild, decide to make this a club project. We decided at the time to keep as much of the original pieces, clean them repaint and restore the model.)

After that, Mary sent me a copy of an article that appeared in the New York Times, dated April 9th, 1941, regarding the portholes on the North Carolina. At the time of launching or shortly before she had portholes, and it was decided that they would be covered over since the British and German navies determined that they tended to create unsafe features on their ships as they would create more damage and allow flooding from bombs or shells in the event of battles. (we have a copy of the article and also note this ship was the first battleship the U.S. Navy had built since 1923. It was considered a fast battleship and the most powerful in the world due to her massive 16-inch guns.)

So now this model has us all foaming at the mouth, because we are finding out more and more about this model almost weekly.

But wait, what about the model displaying painted portholes, and rounded gun turrets? Let's backtrack and pick up about the Whitman Publishing Company.

This kit came out before the N. C. was launched, and the navy did not want to divulge the final design of the ship as war clouds were approaching the U.S. Whitman designed their kit and took designs from post-WWI ships and distributed their kit based on that information. Conversations with the curator and the owner have shifted to the owner showing interest in donating the finish model to the Memorial Museum in Wilmington.


We are in the process of using actual parts that have been supplied by the curator to restore this model. It is mostly all the bamboo card stock that make up the decks, and we will use the plans to construct any smaller parts needed. It is worthy to note, that if you look closely, the model had paper rails which were printed on the side of the plans, along with a selection of signal flags.

We will make the final decision on railing when we meet with the owner and curator at a later date.

I will be adding more photos as progress continues and we get a clear picture of what the Memorial and owner agree to. The main item to remember is that this 80 year old restored model will have 98 percent of the original parts when it was built.

The New York Times ran a short piece on the question of portholes and their ever so wise removal.



The 35,000-ton battleship North Carolina, first battleship to be added to the Navy list since 1923, which is to be commissioned this morning at the Navy Yard in Brooklyn, will be the first man-ofwar without portholes ever to be built in this country.

The North Carolina and her sisters were designed with portholes, but war lessons have shown that the concussive force of large bombs that hit close alongside smash even the steel battle ports and cause interior damage. The portholes, therefore, were blanked off.

The commissioning ceremonies for the giant 16-inch-gun battleship, most powerful in the world, will start at 11:30 A. M. Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox and other distinguished guests from Washington and elsewhere are expected to attend.

Governor J. Melville Broughton of North Carolina arrived yesterday with his staff to attend the ceremonies. He declared there were no labor problems in his State affecting the defense program.

Governor Broughton paid a courtesy call to Mayor La Guardia at City Hall in the afternoon. With the Governor were J. Van B. Metts, adjutant general of the State; Colonel Gordeon Smith ct his staff and Lieutenant Alfred Ward of the North Carolina.

Next up on my list of German Panzers is the Pz.Kpfw 35(t). A Czechoslovak designed light tank, designated Lehky Tank vzor 35 (LT-35), was designed from 1934-1936 and produced from 1936-1940 with 434 built. Of that total, 244 vehicles were seized by Nazi Germany in 1939 following the German occupation of Czechoslovakia.

They were used as a substitute for the Panzer III medium tank and were assigned to Panzer Battalion 65 of the 1st Light Division and the independent Panzer Regiment 11 where they participated in the Invasion of Poland. The 1st Light Division absorbed the 11th Panzer Regiment and was redesignated as the 6th Panzer Division on 18 October 1939.

The tanks were used by Chechoslovakia, Nazi Germany, the Kingdom of Romania, the Slovak Republic, the Kingdom of Bulgaria and the Kingdom of Hungary.

Nazi Germany used them in early combat during WWII, most notably during the Invasion of Poland, the Battle of France and the Invasion of the Soviet Union. They were retired or sold by Nazi Germany in 1942 but still used by other countries for the remainder of the war and by Bulgaria for training purposes all the way into the 1950's.

Originally designed for a 3 man crew, they operated with a 4 man crew and had a range of about 120 miles on the road or 70 miles cross country. The main armament was a 3.7 cm gun with (2) 7.92 mm machine guns as secondary fire power.

The kit is a 1/35 scale model by Academy. The biggest thing about the kit is that the individual track links have to be installed before the upper hull can be assembled, not as per the instructions. I found out the hard way and had to do some "unassembling" before I could continue. So basically you have to complete the lower hull, paint that, then paint the individual track links, install them, and then assembly the rest of the hull.

Then I had to mask off the already finished and painted bottom half of the hull in order to finish painting the rest of the model. Otherwise there's no way to attach the track links if you assemble everything first. And if you follow the instructions, it would be more difficult, for me anyway, to paint the tracks after construction.

After that said, it wasn't that bad once I took it apart and realized what I had to do. I'm sure I made it more complicated than need be but it is what it is.

Other than that, the kit went together without too many headaches and not much loss of sleep and it ended up ok. I painted it in my usual fashion *(continued on page 5)*

(continued from page 3) with Tamiya paints and oils. A little mud, dirt and dust and I think it looks presentable.

So now a couple of Panzer 1's to go and my Panzer collection is complete. At least for now anyway. I'm sure there are some more for me to do on the horizon. There are many German paint schemes to explore and I'm sure I'll want to embark on the challenge as I get better with my airbrush. I'm still not sure about the E-100 but I imagine I'll end up doing that one as well eventually.

#### Confessions of a Closet Modeler By David Stiteler

Back in the days of my youth, say in high school, when I was very active as both a jock and a geek, and building models when I wasn't out getting into trouble, I always listened to the radio. What we call "Classic Rock" now was the new and greatest music ever then. No offence to those that love the 60's and 50's rock and roll. This was the stuff before CD's. If I wasn't listening to the radio, my boom box with the mix "tapes" was playing. But mostly, the radio was the thing.

Those of you that remember those carefree days might also remember Paul Harvey, the radio personality that was famous for his commentaries. Usually on Saturdays, mostly in the afternoon, he would come on. His thing was, "The Rest of The Story". I always enjoyed listening to those stories and learning something from time to time. So, this is my take on "The Rest of The Story".

That Friday night I confined myself to my room with the intent of accomplishing SOMETHING that I had total control over is where I pick up the story. After washing the parts and letting them dry, kicking on the mixed CD of 80's music, I dove in.

Remember, this kit had no relevance to anything, no research was going to be done, and I didn't care if it came out pink or purple, I just wanted to complete, finish something. I wanted to get my head back on straight, and focus. I began the build of this F4F Wildcat with step 1. I was going to follow the directions, step by step if it killed me.

A sidenote here; how many of us look at the directions, and decide to start somewhere other than the beginning because this sub-assembly or that subassembly looks more interesting to start with? I've done that in the past, but for this, no way. Step 1, step 2, etc., etc. Stay focused.

Somewhere around 10pm my wife reluctantly stuck her head in the door

to let me know she was headed to bed. I thanked her for the heads up, put the cockpit assembly down, shut off the Bluetooth speaker and put on the Bluetooth headset, and kept the tunes going and the building progressing. I had to be careful to remember to close the bedroom door and my den's door whenever I fired up the airbrush. My compressor is compact, but not exactly quiet. Since earlier in the evening the mood wasn't exactly the greatest on either side, and I didn't want to make matters any worse by keeping her up.

I must have been really focused in my work on this build because suddenly, I nearly jumped out of my skin when she touched me on my shoulder to let me know she was leaving for work, at 0530 in the morning! I hadn't worked on a model like that since my high school days! How long ago was that? Anyway, I looked down and for the first time I noticed that I had the resemblance of an airplane sitting before me. Wow, this was cool! I hadn't gotten this far in a build for way too long of a time, and it felt great.

After my wife left for work, I decided that it was a good time for a break and grab some breakfast. I noticed that my mood had softened, my thinking was a bit clearer, and I was beginning to relax. I ate my breakfast, then went back upstairs and continued to work on the Wildcat.

At some point, while waiting for something to set or dry, I brought out the P-40 that I thought I had a good start on but realized not so much. For the next couple of hours, I kind of tagged-teamed these two kits, but stayed focused on the Wildcat. Around noon my wife called to check on me and to remind me that we had dinner plans with some friends later. I figured I better stop for a while and take a nap so I wouldn't fall asleep during dinner. But when we got home, I was right back at it.

Sunday, I took a break from modeling, per my wife's request. She wanted to talk

after church. I also wanted to analyze where my heart and mind were at this point. Besides, I realized that I didn't have some of the correct paint and other stuff I needed to finish this Navy Wildcat, and Hobby Lobby was closed for the day. Darn!

To sum things up, by the next weekend I had a nearly completed 1/72nd scale Wildcat. Minor detailing and finishing were needed, and I was done.

I know, some would say who can't finish a 72nd scale airplane in a weekend? Up until now, I couldn't. keep in mind that I hadn't completed, from start to finish, ANY model in over 30+ years. This was a "One step for man, one giant leap for mankind" sort of thing for me.

And I accomplished two other important things in this process. First, I found out for certain that I still LOVE the hobby of model building, not that I'm IN LOVE with the IDEA of model building. There is a difference.

And secondly, I very much needed to get my head on straight and FOCUS on what I want to accomplish and what I needed to do. This build showed that my skills have diminished quite a bit, being out of practice for as long as I have been. Getting my head on straight, and making the adjustments needed to improve was a hard learned lesson.

It's hard enough to admit to oneself of being a flawed person. Publicizing that to others is an entirely different thing, with the hope that if others in this hobby feel the same way, they are not alone.

This Wildcat doesn't match the likes of what William, Jeff, Alan, and all the others in this club can put out. Frankly, it's a bit of a hot mess. I may in time paint nose art on it calling it "Hot Mess". What was important to me was, "Don't think, just do". And I did. Who knows, maybe someday I'll show it off.

# **Musings of the Rafflemeister**

With invaluable support from my wife (known as the Raffle Diva), I have managed the model kit raffle at the last two contests hosted by my IPMS Local Chapter, the Eastern Carolina Plastic Modelers. While the primary qualification to run the first raffle was simply being the only one who volunteered to do it, I had entered kit raffles at several other contests and had a general idea of how it was supposed to work.

The Chapter had offered raffles at prior contests several years before, so I was given some general guidelines and a nifty handmade raffle drum. Both my first (2018) and second (2022, thanks to COVID) raffles were considered successes, in that many tickets were sold, all models were given away and any "drama" was held to a minimum. Based on this experience, the following are some general observations on things that worked (or didn't) for our raffle that may help in the event you find yourself in similar situation in your own Chapter contest.

First, make your raffle an event and not something that runs in the background while everyone is busy doing something else. We perform two raffles during the contest day, one at around 11:00 AM for the early birds and a second at 1:00 PM after the judging has started. Raffle times are listed on the show schedule and mentioned in all advertising. An area is set up with all kits on display before the first person walks in the door, and we have a microphone on hand to provide occasional reminders to the crowd of when the next raffle will start.

Second, it may be somewhat obvious but have a good variety of kits that appeal to various interests and skill levels, and minimize the number of books/decal sets/tools if possible. Not everything has to be the latest release still sealed in the box, but kits that are missing parts, in damaged boxes, are started or are simply "unbuildable" should not be on the raffle table. One of my duties as Rafflemeister is to inspect all unsealed kits for completeness prior to contest day; this

is especially important if you are getting most of your kits through donations. There is a suggestion on what to do with the kits that cannot be used for the raffle at the end of this article.

Third, and probably the most important, let the winners chose their prize. I've been to several events where tickets are drawn and then "assigned" (i.e., taped) to a random kit that then becomes that person's prize regardless of what they are actually interested in. Even with separate drawings for aircraft, armor, etc. it is still "luck of the draw". Our two raffles are both "winner gets choice"; ticket numbers are called individually at the time they are drawn, and the winner has the opportunity to select a single kit from the group designated for that raffle session. The later a ticket is drawn the less choice a person gets, but being able to make a selection and get something in a subject of which you are interested adds to the satisfaction of winning. This also increases the entertainment value of the raffle, as the ticket holder's friends will provide "friendly" advice and younger modelers really get excited when they can pick from any model on the table.

One of the things that did not work well for us was running a Silent Auction area during the show. This involved a halfdozen premium (i.e., expensive) kits that were displayed at a separate table with bidding sheets that had a starting bid and minimum raises specified. There was little interest until the last hour before bidding closed. I attribute this partly to the noncompetitive nature of the average modeler (even though they are at a contest) and the fact that they had to hold enough money to cover their bid until the Silent Auction was done against the lure of the well-stocked vendor area. On the other hand, those that did bid came away with some very nice kits at very nice prices! At a recent show I attended, that Chapter put several premium kits in a special raffle which had a higher ticket price and individual drawings for each kit. I may give that a try at our next show in July 2024.

Finally, I promised a suggestion on what to do with those "less than perfect" kits donated to the raffle. At our last show all of these kits, along with anything else Chapter members wanted to part with, were put on what was called the "Cast-Aways" table (from our location on the Atlantic Coast) and priced at no more than \$5 each. Signs made it quite clear that theses kits were started, incomplete, damaged, or otherwise imperfect. What started out as a considerable pile representing virtually every modeling category turned into an empty table and a modest profit by the end of the show. Modelers may not like a Silent Auction, but they do love a deal!



It is hard to tell what Dennis Morey is working on. With closer examination of the contents of the box...Tamiya masking tape, 3 sets of (possibly) vinyl tape, cutting utensils, files, and a clear sprue, I am guessing Dennis is masking canopies. Indeed I was correct as he is masking the canopies for his 1:32 Junker Ju-87 (kit unknown). Though I did not get a picture of it, he got very far in completing the necessary masking. Good job, Dennis.



Jim, also, brought in a finished model...the MiniArt 1:35 US Army Bulldozer (35195). Jim said it took him quite a while to build. For a small model it has up to 725 pieces! As usual, many of these pieces are covered up when you put the hood over the engine. The model came out beautifully and perfectly weathered. Jim weathered it to show its use by the US Army at the beaches of Normandy (a lot of sand).



Jim Harriet brought in two kits...one to work on for the build and one to show off. The build is the Verlinden Productions resin '8 inch Armstrong rifle' (#1852) used by the Confederate Army at Fort Fisher (Kure Beach, NC) and is now at West Point. Very cool.


