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
# MONOGRAM'S 300 SLR IN 1/24 SCALE

This model represents the car driven by Stirling Moss and journalist-navigator Denis Jenkinson to their win in the 1955 Mille Miglia. With a 3.0 liter engine pulled from the W196 Grand Prix car, the 310 hp could propel the car to a top speed of 180 mph . . . down country roads and through town streets. The 300 SLR was designed following the success of the 300 SL coupes with the gull-wing doors, which won at LeMans and the Carrrera Panamericana Mexican endurance race.

The Mille Miglia race all started around 29BC when Agrippa had the Roman mile standardized at 1,620 yards (1,760 yards in the US today). During the turbulent years before WWII, both Mussolini and Hitler were obsessed with establishing their own versions of the "Roman Empire." After France established the first truly national motor race in 1906, the Grand Prix de l'ACF, the Italians decided to establish their own Gran Premio d'Italia to be run in the industrial city of Brescia in 1921. But, when this race was moved to the Monza autodrome for 1922, the people of Brescia felt slighted.

A rival race was established from Brescia to Rome and back, close to 1000 Roman miles and thus the Mille Miglia was born. First run in 1927 and run annually until 1938, when an awful accident left 10 spectators dead and 26 injured. Not run in 1939, a diminished version covering 62 miles of public roads in a loop from Brescia-Mantua-Cremona-Brescia in 1940. After the war, it was run again in 1947, with Alpha Romeo winning for the 11th time. Ferrari took the honors from 1948-1953, before a double defeat at the hands of Lancia, then Mercedes-Benz in 1954-55. Ferrari came back to win in 1956 and the final race in 1957.

Though this is an older Monogram kit, it went together reasonably well and the only real modification I made was to the engine intake, where I replaced the cast piece with individual runners. I did run into some challenges as I tried to match historic photos, but also using pictures of the restored car that sits in the Mercedes Museum. The restored car occasionally makes its way out onto the track and visited the Monterey Historic Races one year, where Stirling Moss drove Jay Leno around for a few laps.

But therein lies the problem . . . the restored car is not exactly like the car that was raced by Moss and Jenkinson in 1955, nor are all 300 SLR race cars built the same. I installed the chrome pieces over the side outlets, but soon discovered that the #722 did not have them in the 1955 race. Off they came and I had

to fill the spots. At the end of the build, one of the last parts to go on was the front marker lights. Using the pictures of the restored car (nice color shots) I put them on, not really liking the look of them. After looking at period pictures again, I found a shot of the front view and low and behold . . . no marker lights. Damn, too late to fix that mistake.

An interesting detail is the screen intake on the passenger side of the hood. The kit provides a plastic piece with a screen pattern molded on it. I decided that was not good enough, so I used a piece of a fancy tea bag that I shaped with the plastic part and glued in place. Turned out rather nice if I say so myself.


Paint was from MCW, my go to for accurate automotive colors. The decals I used where an aftermarket set from IndyCals and they were great, except there were no instructions, so I was not happy with the way the decals for the seat material came out. And the biggest pain on the decal front was the fact that the chrome emblems on the back hood are cast as part of the body, but the decal of the number across the back is supposed to lay underneath the chrome emblems. I did the best I could, but was not totally satisfied.

So, a good kit overall, with the requisite challenges that let you know, "you are a modeler," so enjoy the ride. ■



# DOWNEASTCON 2024 CONTEST RULES

- 1. Models will be judged against each other based on standard IPMS judging guidelines. Each Category will have a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place. There is no Out of Box (OOB) award. First place models in a Category are eligible to be judged for "Best of Class" (901-907) Special Awards. Only the Best of Class winners are eligible to be judged for the "Best of Show" (909) Special Award. Any "theme model" is eligible for that Theme Special Award regardless of placement within a category.
- 2. A contestant can enter a maximum of 10 (ten) models total of which no more than 6 per class and no more than 2 per category. A modified "No Sweeps" rule is in effect that states a modeler cannot take all 3 places in a category but can take 2 of 3 places. (NOTE: Juniors classes are exempt from this rule and can enter unlimited models)
- **3.** This is a family-friendly show. The Head Judge may exclude from competition and/or public display and entrieswhich he/she considers to be offensive to generally acknowledged standards of taste and acceptability. This does not apply to historical aircraft nose-art.
- 4. All entries must be the sole work of the individual whose name is on the registration and entry forms, with the exception of category 001 where juniors may have limited parental aid subject to judges' acceptance. However, a surrogate may bring another person's model, but the registration must be that of the builder. Commercially built and/or finished models (die-cast, etc) won't be accepted for entry in any category.
- 5. Models are entered solely at the entrants' risk. Eastern Carolina Plastic Modelers does not assume any liability for loss or damage to any model. Models may be handled during judging. If necessary, we will ask the modeler to remove display cases prior to judging. If you do not want your model touched, please state so in writing in the notes section (on page 1 of Model Builder Registration). This statement must include your cell phone number so you can be called to move your own model. If you do not respond to the call, your model will not be judged.
- **6. Vignettes vs. Dioramas:** The number of subjects (vehicles and/or figures) will determine in which category an entry is placed.

**Vignettes:** A single vehicle and/or no more than 5 figures. Vignettes will be placed in the proper Class/Category.

**Dioramas:** Dioramas are story-centric, specifically built to tell a story or convey a message, and with 2 or more vehicles and/ or more than 5 figures. Dioramas will be placed in Class VII and the appropriate category(ies). The storyline will be considered equally to construction and finish of the individual subjects, figures, and other presentation components.

Builds and dioramas largest measurement must be no more than twenty four inches, (24"). Larger sizes must have prior clearance from the con committee to be displayed.

- 7. Junior entrants ages 13 to 17 (category 002.) may compete in either junior categories OR all other categories, but not both. Please fill in the proper category you wish to enter.
- 8. The Contest Registration Committee will assist in determin-

ing entry class and category at the time of registration. If an entry qualifies to be in more than one category (i.e., a 1/32 biplane could be either 102 or 118) the entrant may select which category he would like the model to compete. In all cases the final determination rests with the Chief Judge and the decision of the Chief Judge is final. Any category may be split or combined at the discretion of the Chief Judge to balance numbers of entries for competition.

- **9a.** If a registered model also qualifies to be in a theme (see theme descriptions on page 1 and Rules 13 & 14) the builder can register said model(s) in its appropriate category(ies) plus check off the Korea or Shoot the Moon box on the registration form. Then the model(s) will be judged for both category and theme(s). If the theme box(es) are not checked, then the model(s) will only be judged within the registered category(ies).
- **9b.** Judging: IPMS guideline standards will be used with every numbered category. Judges are not allowed to judge a category in which they are entered. For Korean & Shoot the Moon themes, models within a single Class will be judged together no matter their category. (Ex. All Korean theme marked Military Vehicles will be judged together no matter category or scale).
- 10. An entry which has won a Gold/1st place medal or the People's Choice Award in any previous DownEastCon will be placed on our Display Only Table. Silver and Bronze winners of previous DownEastCons can be judged for 2024. Those models that won Gold/1st place in other contests can be entered for judging.
- 11. Automotive Category Definitions.

**FACTORY STOCK** - A vehicle as it would have come from the factory paint; must resemble factory paint; wheels can be replaced. *Documentation may be requested for any vehicle that appears unusual.* 

**HOT/STREET RODS, STREET MACHINES** - Modified vehicles intended to be street driven. Models must be street legal; treaded tires, exhaust systems, license plate, etc.

**COMPETITION** (open wheel and/or closed wheel) - Those vehicles intended for a track (whether round, left/right or straight).

- COMMERCIAL (Heavy and/or light) Those vehicles intended for the service industry (think of your local plumber up to long haul trucker). They would have some sort of markings to indicate which industry for which they are working. CUSTOMS Vehicles that have undergone extensive body work, designed for display competitions, and may or may not be street legal.
- 12. Korea War (1950-1953): Models must represent those nations and the vehicles, equipment, and personnel present in the conflict. Here are the nations we will allow for Korean theme: Great Britain, Canada, France, Belgium, the Netherlands, Colombia, Ethiopia, South Africa, New Zealand, Türky, Greece, Thailand, Philippines and Luxembourg sent fighting units. Norway, Sweden, Denmark, India, Italy contributed military hospitals and field ambulances to the cause.
- **13.** Shoot the Moon Awards (Apollo 11–17): Models must represent any person, place, event, or equipment that qualifies as a Real Space entry, starting with Apollo 11's launch on July 16, 1969, to the splash- down of Apollo 17 on December 19, 1972.

# Confessions of a Closet Modeler

The battle of wills between myself and this Monogram F-100 kit continues. Now, in the past before my 30-plus year hiatus of building models, I remember building Monogram models, and enjoying them. Of course, back in those days' kits weren't as technologically engineered as they are today, but Monogram kits had a reputation of being a highly desirable model to build, and in some cases the standard. The level of detail and accuracy of that detail was top notch. I remember in discussions with my friends, the general feeling was Monogram over Revell for quality, detail, accuracy and price, and then if you had the funds, Hasegawa and Tamiya.

# There are exceptions, of course.

Yes, most models have a bit of a fit problem somewhere, no matter what you are building; cars, ships, aircraft, whatever. And in most of these cases the fitness issues are delt with, with relative ease and we move on. The last model I built before life got in my way and I had to put the hobby on the back burner was a beautiful model of the S-3 Viking in 1/72nd scale by Hasegawa. The detail and fit of that kit was outstanding, except for the pylons for the external tanks on the wings. The engine pylons were terrific, but outboard of those for the wing tanks, the fit just wasn't right. I could never get them to mold smoothly to the underside of the wing. Later I found out that a slight gap was normal because of the way they bolt on to the wings, so scale wise, it wouldn't have been an issue.

Oh well. I wish I still had that model, but unfortunately, it was discarded without my knowledge by a family member that my younger brother and I no longer associate with. That's another story....

Getting back to the Super Sabre, the main issue here is where the fuselage halves attach to the wing assembly. First, the fuselage is an upper piece and lower piece, not left and right like most aircraft models. I never liked the way upper and lower fuselage halves fit together in any aircraft kit, and in this case, Monogram really buggered it up.

The issue is how the two halves come together over and under the wing assembly. The lower half of the assembly is a one-piece part with both lower left and right wings sections and a center section where the fuselage halves attach to it, and then the top sections of the wings are to be attached to the assembly, closing the gap between fuselage and wing. On most aircraft kits, the wings are attached individually left and right to the fuselage, where that could create a fit issue. Those are usually easy to deal with.

My problem is, the Chief that gave me this kit did some pell-mell assembly of parts prior to giving me this kit, and it was obvious he didn't follow the instructions. OK, no big deal, right? Wrong! Unfortunately, he assembled the wings first and this has created an issue that no matter how I try it, the two halves of the fuselage will not fit properly over and under the wing assembly, or to each other behind the wing assembly... that is without, I suspect, some major surgery first.

I have been told by my wife, and my son who is home on leave right now, that the sounds and comments emanating from my upstairs den that can't be repeated here are akin to being somewhat comical and sometimes scary, with a touch of indecency. Oh, how I love this hobby! I'll fight through this, somehow. I will not let this...plane...destroy my confidence! I will prevail!

And then my son, whom I love dearly, and home for a short time from Korea, has the audacity to stick his head through the door with a smile on his face, and very innocently asks, "Hey Dad, how's that B-17 coming along?". What a way to hurt a guy.

What was that? I think a hear a B-17 calling me from out of the fog. ■



Occasionally there is a 'mainstream' article about hobbies in general or our hobby in particular. Generally speaking, these recent peeks into this thing of ours tend to be positive.

But it wasn't always this way.

When it came to Hollywood from the 70s through to the 90s, the common theme was that only disturbed or at least very strange people would engage in model building as adults. Back then, if a director wanted to depict a fictional character as a scary anti-social adult, all that was needed was some built Airfix models hanging from the dingy ceiling in his messy bedroom. To show a truly disturbed character, the director only had to start the scene with a character building a model in a dank basement. Preferably with a naked and flickering pullchain bulb overhead. Throw in an oversized visor over coke-bottle glasses and you got yourself a mass murderer!

For the most part, audiences accepted those portrayals. This is because hobbies, especially for adults, were not seen as healthy pursuits. It was generally believed there was a very fine line between enthusiasm for such 'childish pursuits' and an unhealthy pre-occupation with them.

During this same timeframe, when we were not considered scary and potentially dangerous, we model makers were lumped and ridiculed with other hobbyists in the persecution of all things labeled "geek".

All that seemed to change with the millennium and what some have called the new 'geek chic'. All of a sudden it was socially acceptable for adults to have hobbies. Adults could play video games and not lose their

jobs. Adults could dress up as comic book characters, attend comic book or sci-fi-related conventions, and not be hauled off to mental institutions. Adults could freely collect and display action figures. Making models may not have been as cool as phone app development, but it was no longer something to be ashamed of.

Quite the opposite.

And now we find ourselves amid the strangest decade in recent memory. Things have truly been turned on their head. Even before the pandemic, I noticed a growing focus on the importance of "mental health". Plenty of experts have stressed the need for everyone to decompress and find outlets to be creative. Mental health experts have unanimously agreed on the benefits of having a hobby like model making.

Imagine that. What used to be considered to be unhealthy to the point of community concern has now transformed into something healthy with societal benefits.

Getting More out of Hobbies as an

I'm amazed a blog post about adult hobbies was re-posted on Google News. More importantly, the content is well worth the five-minute read. Elsie Larson has some very interesting things to say about having a hobby and all of it can relate to this model-building thing we do.

Under the heading 'Lower your standards' the key takeaway is that one can still enjoy the benefits of a hobby despite not having a lot of time to pursue it. Thirty minutes at a time at the bench is still worthwhile if that is all the time you can devote. Over the course of a week, it can still move a project along.

We often hear the line 'I'll tackle that project when my skills improve'.

Well, 'Keep Learning and Keep Making' is all about how to keep your hobby fresh and improve your skills. It is something that I have talked about before. This is the only way to get better at anything and making that the focus of your hobby time is well worth it. Even if winning awards is not the ultimate goal of your hobby (and it shouldn't be) trying new things and learning from mistakes keeps things fresh and fun.

However, I believe 'Remove the Guilt' is the star of that blog post. Maybe someone starts a model but shelves it for a few months. Maybe that builder goes out and gets all the supplies and aftermarket for a model, but keeps it in the stash for years. Not starting, not using, not finishing... these can bring a misguided sense of guilt to us builders. Especially when others remind us of our building shortfalls.

Elsie Larson finds it helpful to 'remove guilt altogether' from her hobbies. She goes on to state:

The point of hobbies is usually not some kind of end goal, it's usually a creative experience. It helped me to think of my hobbies as an ongoing lifelong project. If I don't achieve the goals I set, I make new ones and move on. My biggest goal is to live a creative life. It's OK to be sporadic and imperfect with your hobbies...
